### WRITING PLACEMENT GUIDE

### **FIRST-YEAR STUDENTS**

Writing Placement Score: First Year students who graduated from high school in the United States and took the ACT will be placed into a Writing class based on their Writing Placement Score.

•WPS OF 1=WRTG 2010

•WPS OF 2= WRTG 1010

Writing 1010 must be completed with a C- or better before taking Writing 2010.

\*Students without a Writing Placement Score must obtain a placement by taking the writing placement essay exam at the Testing Center before they are eligible to register.

#### AP EXAMS

A score of 4 or above on an AP English Test (Comp/Reading, Comp Lit or Language) waives the lower division writing requirement (WR2) for General Education purposes. However, some majors require completion of WRTG 2010 regardless of AP Score.

•A score of 4 waives WRTG 2010

•A score of 3 places the student into WRTG 2010

#### TRANSFER STUDENTS

\*Transfer students who have not taken a writing course equivalent to WRTG 1010 must take a writing placement essay at the Testing Center to determine their placement.

Transfer students who took a 1010 equivalent course at a previous institution are placed into WRTG 2010. Transfer students who took a second writing course equivalent to WRTG 2010 at a previous institution or have an Associate of Arts, Associate of Science or a Bachelor's degree have completed the lower division writing requirement.

### INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

International students fulfill the lower division writing requirement (WR2) with the ESL 1040, 1050, 1060 sequence. The English as a Second Language placement exam, available in the Testing Center, places students into either ESL 1040 or 1050. A grade of C- or better is needed to advance. ### STUDENTS WHO HAVE NEVER TAKEN A LANGUAGE:

Start with 1010 and advance through 2020 to complete the B.A. language requirement.

## STUDENTS WHO HAVE LEARNED A LANGUAGE IN A PREVIOUS CLASSROOM SETTING (HIGH SCHOOL OR COLLEGE):

Take a language placement test through the Languages and Literature Department (801-581-7561, OSH 112 (The DiBona Center)). You may be able to start higher than 1010 and take fewer courses to advance through 2020.

# STUDENTS WHO LEARNED A LANGUAGE WHILE LIVING IN ANOTHER COUNTRY (MISSIONS, MILITARY, AND OTHER SIMILAR COMMITMENTS):

Take the 3060 course (if offered at the University of Utah). This is the best option if you plan to major or minor in the language **OR** take a proficiency exam and purchase 16 lower division credits.

• French, German, Italian, Russian, or Spanish—Take the MLA exam at the Testing Center (801-581-8744, 498 SSB)
